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# A Message from Maine AAP's President, Brian Youth, MD, FAAP

December already- no way!

Happy post-Thanksgiving. I hope you had some time to spend with family or friends this week and take a break from the daily surprises in our ever-

changing world. I want to share two reflections with you:

National AAP recently outlined the following public health and prevention policies that we will need to stay focused on as we enter 2025 and beyond. These themes will be no surprise to you and include supporting, as we always have, routine childhood and adolescent immunization efforts, gun violence prevention, nicotine and tobacco prevention, financing and access to health care, reproductive and confidential adolescent healthcare, child welfare, immigration, and school health, among others. Daunting as this may seem, one quote stood out to me from the presentation and that is that "although we are in a time of change and uncertainty, when we focus on children, we know what to do and what is effective, and we will stay true to our mission and values- pro-child, pro-science." I very much appreciated the AAPs advice on advocacy strategies and planning which include building partnerships and relationships, relying on messaging and storytelling, and finding shared values in a non-partisan way. We will focus on our credibility as pediatricians, and our mission, while recognizing when to lead, when to partner, and when to let other voices lead. Please join me in relying on our national organization of expert committees, councils and sections to guide us as we continue to focus on what's best for children.

My second reflection is a simple one. Sit on the floor. I have the privilege of teaching in the pediatric resident clinic at Maine Medical Center and I LOVE THE LITTLE CHAIRS that are in some of the exam rooms. I try to set a daily goal of sitting in one of those chairs, or right on the floor when a resident is wrapping up a visit- this gives me the opportunity to, in an unobtrusive way, watch the resident provide anticipatory guidance but also to evaluate the social skills of the child in the room. I gain so much insight as I watch them try to take my badge or a pen from my pocket, or bring a book over to me, turn around, and sit in my lap, pointing to the book and without words, clearly communicating- read to me.

Bringing myself into their world, on the floor, I leave those interactions with a smile on my face even on the most challenging days. I wholeheartedly recommend doing this daily if you don't already- and you may make a new friend along the way.
